












### Sophs experiment with English 3200

A new approach to grammar was used for the first time in some of the sophomore classes. The program, called English 3200, allows the pupil to go at his own rate and to concentrate on his own weak spots. Along with their study of literature of the Medieval Age, a few senior sections sang Old English Ballads to the accompaniment of a guitar.



### Art develops creative talents



ART students at Mankato high keep up with an active schedule through the school year. They are called on to use their talents in various fields, such as drawing posters, working on Junior Class, One-Act, and Senior Class plays and making signs.

Art I is a study of design, exposing students to all medias of art. Art II and Art III specialize in certain fields of study. Art II is a survey of sculpture, ceramics and jewelry. 

#### timulates thought

**W** ITH more emphasis placed on experimentation, the Advanced Biology course expanded into a two-class reality this year. A new textbook, the second of the BSCS series, extended the areas of study covered in the first year. Biology introduced its students to the science of life and to some of the fundamental laboratory procedures.

While chemistry students struggled to memorize symbols and equations, Chem Study classes were faced with the challenge of open-book tests. These tests, designed to produce thought instead of facts, proved to be hard to get used to for many students.


In physics the trend was toward the PSSC course as two more classes of it were added to the curriculum. The basis of the course was experiments involving paralax, triangulation and other basic methods.

In the math field, two types of courses are offered at MHS. SMSG provides the student with the modern approach, while the standard maths present the traditional approach.

#### Fine Arts enrich

A select group of seniors in five classes studied the Humanities, which asks and tries to answer basic questions and challenges students to think up their own answers.

For the first time, speech students gave talks on closed circuit television. This enabled them to better observe themselves.

Latin I students basically learned grammar, while Latin II students read about Caesar and studied mythology. Cicero's Letters and Orations and Ovid's Metamorpose were read by third year students. In German classes, students made and brought German foods such as the pastry, Stollen.

Two newspapers, Bonjour and Chez Nous, which had records to go along with them, were used for the first time in French classes. First and second year Spanish students concentrated on vocabulary and grammar, while third year students discovered the literature of Spanish-speaking countries.

TYPING classes used a speed and accuracy approach. They have a new textbook called Twentieth Century Typewriting. It is an experiment in directions. Instead of receiving them from the teacher, the directions are in the book. General clerical and secretarial office classes had a week of data processing added to the courses. Shorthand II had a new textbook which has the revised form of Gregg shorthand. Bookkeeping teaches principles, careful thinking, neatness, budgeting and business.

Interested in MHS and vocational students, the guidance department is always ready and willing to counsel them. Seniors especially need help concerning college and future plans. Test scores and scholarships come through the guidance office.

In order to help teachers carry out their programs, the library now has 10,500 volumes and 280 phonograph records. Twelve students volunteered their services as assistant librarians during their study hall each day.

A IMING toward the goal of making every student more physically fit, the physical education department offered a variety of sports and activities. 

#### Vocational school awaits move

A MONG plans for curriculum changes are those for building a new area Vocational school. At the present time there are 412 high school students enrolled in day-time courses. The vocational department is also in charge of Home Economics and Occupational Relations.

A citizen's advisory committee, appointed by the board of education, has recommended that an enlarged school be built. It would be a Vocational-Technology school for post high school students. If and when the old building is relieved of the crowded situation it is now faced with, many changes will take place. The industrial arts and other similar departments will enlarge. Also, the high school Audio-Visual department, library work room, and possibly some administrative offices would be moved to the old vocational building.

Starting this year, vocational students were offered an industrial arts course which met only one hour per day. There were also two more classes of power mechanics.

#### pursts its seams

**B** ACKACHES became a common complaint this year as assemblies and lyceums were held in the gymnasium instead of the auditorium. For the first time students had to take certain routes down to the gym to avoid congestion in the halls.

Enrollment increased from 1,198 to 1,260 this year. All three classes surpassed the 400 mark, while the senior class had the greatest increase with about 50 transfer students. The school district is considering building a second high school.

















### Band, choir entertain public








# Boys show talent in SML



SML was sponsored by the Safety and Recreation Department, with Ed Johnson serving as co-ordinator.










The 1965 season marked the first time Southview Country club was used for the home course. A large increase in fan support urged the Scarlets on.













Co-captains Gary Rudenick and Barry Bertrand maintained undefeated records to stand with the best ever at Mankato high school.


Two other seniors, Doug Roy and Dale Stolt, had only seven dual meet losses between them.

The 1965-66 Big Nine conference race was won by Albert Lea while Mankato was tied for seventh place.



Absences ran high the week term papers were due, while bleary-eyed juniors typed 'til the wee hours of the morning.



Sophomore girls were introduced to the ever-popular, form-fitting, tank suits as swimming became a required part of physical education.


Dissecting frogs, worms and crayfish provided variety for those taking biology. "Silas Marner" and "Huckleberry Finn" were required reading in sophomore English.
